

"Decentralized Music: Exploring Blockchain for Artistic Research"

Edited by Paulo de Assis (Orpheus Institute) and Adam Łukawski (Leiden University)

Abstract: This book offers a thorough exploration of the potential of blockchain and AI technologies to transform musical practices. Including contributions from leading researchers in music, arts, and technology, it addresses central notions of agency, authorship, ontology, provenance, and ownership in music.

Together, the chapters of this book, often navigating the intersections of post-digital and posthumanist thought, challenge conventional centralized mechanisms of music creation and dissemination, advocating for new forms of musical expression.

Stressing the need for the artistic community to engage with blockchain and AI, this volume is essential reading for artists, musicians, researchers, and policymakers curious to know more about the implications of these technologies for the future of music. The premiere date is 14 August 2024 and since 24 July 2024 the book is available for pre-order.

Data Carpentry for Social Sciences and Humanities is a hands-on training that covers best practices for data organisation in spreadsheets, reproducible data cleaning using the tool OpenRefine, and gives an introduction to data analysis and visualisation using the programming language R.

The **target audience** of this workshop is PhD candidates and researchers with **no prior to little computational experience**.

The tabular dataset used for practice during the course comes from the social sciences field (i.e., survey data in a tabular form).
