Understanding human language through the lens of sign languages

Short description

Deaf communities across the globe have been using sign languages for centuries. In 1995, Uganda was the first country in the world to officially recognize its sign language, the Netherlands followed suit in 2021. But how different are the sign languages of the world? And what does this tell us about their histories? And why are some signs very similar across sign languages, and others very different?

Our understanding of how linguistics is predominantly based on spoken languages. In this course, we will look at what sign languages tell us about the human language faculty and discuss implications for linguistic theory.

Victoria Nyst is associate professor in the field of Sign Languages and Deaf Studies, with a particular focus on a) African contexts, and b) historical perspectives.
